Investigaciones de Historia Económica 2005-2025

A brief summary of the last 20 years

Investigaciones de Historia Económica-Economic History Research (IHE-EHR) has reached the mark of 20 years. As the journal of the Spanish Association of Economic History (*Asociación Española de Historia Económica*, AEHE), it has aimed at the dissemination of economic history, business history, and the history of economic thought. Over these two decades, several editorial teams have managed the journal. Since 2019, and once it joined the *Repositorio Español de Ciencia y Tecnología (RECYT)*, all content has been freely available for download in PDF format, reinforcing the journal's commitment to open science.



Although twenty years have already passed, IHE-EHR is a relatively *young* journal (see Table 1). In 2020, it was included in the Emerging Sources Citation Index (ESCI) and thereby incorporated into the Web of Science (WoS) database. In 2024, the *Journal Citation Reports* (*JCR*) unified rankings across subject categories and incorporated ESCI journals. As a result, IHE-EHR can now be compared with other journals in terms of Impact Factor (IF) and citations. Besides, articles and book reviews have been indexed by Scopus since 2011, and all content from 2005 onwards is available in Dialnet. The journal is thus indexed in the most prestigious international and national databases.

In accordance with the editorial policy, IHE-EHR publishes three issues per year (February; June; and October). Between 2005 and 2024, the journal has published 315 peer-reviewed articles and 570 book reviews – an average of 5 articles and 10 book reviews per issue (see Graph 1). These publications have involved 617 individual researchers (458 men and 159 women) as single authors or coauthors. In this regard, the number of female authors has ranged between 16% to 38% while the number of female reviewers has steadily grown, with women accounting for approximately 30-40% of the total in recent years.

Also, the journal has published 4 research notes, 12 *in memoriam*, and 1 *panorama*. Within the peer-reviewed articles, 41 were part of *special issues* (see Table 2) while 17 were awarded the *Premio Ramón Carande* by the AEHE, thereby implying than more than 80% of the peer-reviewed articles followed an ordinary path. The journal carries out an editorial review followed by a double-blind peer review with a minimum of two evaluations. Therefore, it is worth remembering the hundreds of researchers from Spain and abroad who have been reviewers in these twenty years.

Another aspect is the language of publication as IHE-EHR publishes in both Spanish and English. Although most of the articles and book reviews are still published in Spanish, there is an upward trend of English-written works. Since 2021, almost a third of the academic articles were in English. In Table 3, articles have been ranked by the Journal of Economic Literature (JEL) system of classification, often referred as JEL codes. As expected, given the aims and scope of the journal, the JEL codes capturing economic history predominated. Likewise, a broad coverage can be appreciated. Table A.1 below shows the top 10 articles in terms of citations.

The Latin American bond

For a long time, scholars have analyzed a variety of topics about Latin American economic history, such as the relationship between institutions and economic growth, financial development, or living standards. IHE-EHR has participated in the development of this field, by publishing numerous articles. For instance, in "La desigualdad económica regional en América Latina (1895-2010)" (2020, Vol. 16, No. 3), the authors analyzed the evolution of regional inequality in nine Latin American economies from the late 19th century. In "La integración comercial de América Latina en el espejo del Pacífico" (2022, Vol. 18, No. 2), the role of market

forces and the process of regional integration in Latin America and the Asian-Pacific region was examined. In "Trade finance and Latin America's lost decade: The forgotten link" (2014, Vol. 10. No. 2), the author examined the impact of trade finance on international trade in the decade that followed Latin America's debt crisis, whereas the article entitled "The real wages and living conditions of construction workers in Santiago de Chile during the later colonial period, 1788–1808" (2015, Vol. 11, No. 2) looked at real wages and living conditions of construction workers in Santiago de Chile in the late colonial period. Table A.2 below illustrates the top 5 articles on Latin America in terms of citations.

Overall, ten articles on Latin American economic history were published by IHE-EHR in 2005-09, 16 in 2010-14, 13 in 2015-19, and 21 in 2020-24. Moreover, in 2020, IHE-EHR published a special issue on the economic history of Latin America, including articles with a wide variety of topics such as regional development, education, wellbeing and business history. This bond with Latin American is formally recognised in the journal's regulations, which stipulate that one of the co-editors must be from the region.
